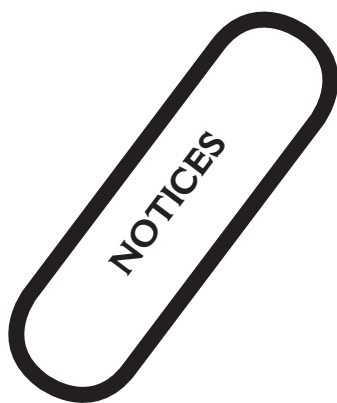

CALL FOR PROPOSALS

THE Government of Saint Lucia has received financing from the International Development Association (the World Bank) towards the cost of the Caribbean Regional Communications Infrastructure Programme (CARCIP) and it intends to apply part of the proceeds towards nurturing of local innovation and to develop a more sustainable entrepreneurial base by providing grant funding for ICT/ ICT Enabled interventions/projects submitted by Micro and Small to Medium sized Enterprises (SMEs).

The Government of Saint Lucia herein represented by the Ministry of the Public Service, Information and Broadcasting, now invites eligible local businesses from all economic sectors to apply for financial assistance, Business Incubator Grants, under the ICT –LED Innovation component of the project.

Eligibility

Grants will be made available to registered micro as well as small to medium sized enterprises to support Innovative ICT and ICT enabled

strategic business development interventions/projects under the following specific categories:

Technical Assistance: This category will provide financial assistance for short term consultancy services, such as market studies, development of a business plan, feasibility studies and any other specialized technical assistance identified by CARCIP.

Or

Business Development Assistance: This category will facilitate financing of a new business venture, business model service or product that is innovative and technology based and that could increase the sustainability and profitability of the enterprise. These include Investments in equipment, Intellectual or Industrial property protection; and Industry Certification Product and Process upgrades etc. Applications under this component must be supported by a Business Plan.

Eligible businesses are required to complete the requisite Application forms in English and provide relevant documentation as outlined by the Application Guidelines. TERMS OF REFERENCE

Consultancy: Development of
Water Quality Monitoring and

BACKGROUND

Saint Lucia, like most other small-island states, traditionally depends heavily on a healthy freshwater and marine environment for a number of economic and social activities, with inland activities impacting on coastal resources and activities, including tourism, fishing and recreation. In recent years, coastal tourism activities such as SCUBA diving and snorkeling, and increased fishing effort to support the seafood activities now being held in a number of communities, have contributed significantly to the island's economy.

Saint Lucia's coastal waters, like those of many countries within the Wider Caribbean Region, are under increasing threat from a number of land-based pollutants. According to the United Nations Environment Programme – Caribbean Environment Programme (UNEP-CEP), land-based pollutants in the form of sewage, oil hydrocarbons, sediments, nutrients, pesticides, litter and marine debris, currently constitute the greatest threat to Caribbean public health and coastal and marine habitats. Specifically in the case of Saint Lucia, improper sewage treatment and disposal, as well as sedimentation, have been identified as the biggest threats to the integrity of the island's coastal waters and habitats.

In an attempt to address the increasing threat to the Caribbean Sea and its associated habitats, the Convention for the Protection and Development of the Marine Environment in the Wider Caribbean Region (Cartagena Convention) was adopted in 1983 and entered into force in 1986. Under the Cartagena Convention, Contracting Parties, such as Saint Lucia, are required to adopt measures aimed at preventing, reducing and controlling pollution and take appropriate measures to protect and preserve rare or fragile ecosystems, as well as the habitats of depleted, threatened or endangered species.

The Convention is supplemented by three Protocols:

Protocol Concerning Co-operation in Combating Oil Spills in the Wider Caribbean Region

Protocol Concerning Specially Protected Areas and Wildlife (SPA/W)

Protocol Concerning Pollution from Land-Based Sources and Activities (LBS)

The Government of Saint Lucia recognises the importance of the Caribbean Sea to the continued economic development of the island, and as such, Saint Lucia became the 4th country to ratify the Land Based Sources of Marine Pollution (LBS) Protocol in January 2008. The LBS Protocol seeks to respond to the protection of the marine environment from land-based point and non-point sources of marine pollution by outlining the types of control and management responses required for addressing land-based issues.

Insufficient water quality monitoring programmes has been highlighted as a critical challenge faced in implementing the Protocol.

The Government of Saint Lucia (GOSL) has been actively engaged in various initiatives to address the increasing threat to the marine environment from a number of land-based pollutants:

The Ministry of Health and the Department of Fisheries have since 2002 been carrying out a joint coastal water quality monitoring programme in select areas in the north, west and south-west coasts of Saint Lucia.

In 2009, Guidelines for Recreational Water Quality were developed to contribute to the management of riverine and coastal waters, and established parameters and limits for same. The Guidelines were adopted as a national standard in 2010.

Concerns about the deterioration of water quality within the northwest coast of the island gave rise to the implementation of the "Mainstreaming Saint Lucia's National Plan of Action through a North West Coast Water Quality Demonstration Project", a two-phase initiative which aimed to raise awareness of the issues associated

with degraded water quality in the coastal zone and to implement actions that will reduce the discharge of point and non-point source pollution into waterways and the coastal environment.

The GOSL in 2011 commissioned investigations to determine and recommend the most appropriate treatment and/or outfall options necessary to improve wastewater management practices within the Castries urban and sub-urban area as well as improve water quality within the Castries Harbour.

In this regard, it is opportune that the Caribbean Regional Fund for Wastewater Management (CR/W) Project was developed to assist countries in achieving improved wastewater management, with repercussions on water quality and coastal zone management. The CR/W Project, established in June 2011, seeks to provide sustainable financing for the wastewater sector, support policy and legislative reforms, and foster regional dialogue and knowledge exchange among key stakeholders in the Wider Caribbean Region. The overall objective of the GEF CR/W Project is to "in the context of the Cartagena Convention and LBS Protocol, pilot revolving fund mechanisms and their wastewater management reforms that can be subsequently established as feasible instruments to provide sustainable financing for the implementation of environmentally sound and cost-effective wastewater management measures". Due to Government of Saint Lucia's continued commitment to the issue of recreational water quality, Saint Lucia was one of the first countries to fully endorse the CR/W Project.

Duration:

The expected duration of this consultancy is approximately five (5) months from the date of execution of contract.

Objective of the Consultancy:

The overall objective of this exercise is to develop a comprehensive Water Quality Monitoring and Analysis Programme, with training in water

quality data capture and analysis for Saint Lucia.

SCOPE OF CONSULTING SERVICES

The Water Quality Monitoring and Analysis Programme developed under this Consultancy will include goals and objectives, identification of type and sources of pollution, relevant stakeholders to be engaged, and a monitoring system that can be implemented based on various levels of funding, technical support, timelines and other resources. The Programme will also identify the necessary equipment, data management considerations, staffing needs, timelines and budget, parameters to be monitored, training, data management, analysis, and reporting protocols. Priority actions that are designed to be undertaken to improve water quality management in Saint Lucia will also be presented.

The Consultancy will identify training, financial, human and other resources needed for implementation of priority actions identified in the Water Quality Monitoring and Analysis Programme. A capacity-building initiative will be designed and delivered to relevant parties as a pilot training programme in water quality management and monitoring.

The Consultant will be required to provide the following services:

Conduct a review of existing water quality monitoring initiatives to determine their adequacy for assessing freshwater and coastal water quality, and to identify and address any needs and gaps;

Develop a Water Quality Monitoring and Analysis Programme to ensure the optimal capture, analysis and use of data reflecting quality of riverine and coastal water resources for long-term water resources management; and

Design and implement a capacity-building initiative to enhance awareness and capability to effectively assess and manage water quality in Saint Lucia.

SPECIFIC TASKS AND DELIVERABLES

In conducting the proposed assignment, the Consultant will be expected to use all applicable tools to collect relevant information and to inform the process of Water Quality Monitoring and Analysis Programme development. The Consultant shall propose a methodology and timeline for approval by the Project Management Team.

The Consultant will be required to undertake the following:

Task 1: Inception meeting and preparation of a work plan

A working inception meeting between the Project Management Team and the Consultant will be held to (i) review the process for the conduct of the research, (ii) determine roles and responsibilities, (iii) discuss the basis on which this consultancy will be implemented, and iv) finalise the work plan and timetable. A final work plan and report on the outcome of the inception meeting will be prepared by the Consultant, and submitted no later than two (2) weeks from commencement of works.

Task 2: Literature and Activity Review

Conduct a review of past and ongoing water quality management exercises, reports, background information and other relevant documentation, in order to compile data and information relevant to developing an understanding and appreciation of water quality management in Saint Lucia.

Task 3: Consultation with Stakeholders

Conduct stakeholder consultations with relevant water resource management, public health and related agencies, Government departments, non-governmental organizations, and other stakeholders to highlight major issues to be addressed and to identify any gaps in previous work undertaken. These consultations must be done in collaboration with the Project Management Team, and attendance

and results of discussions must be documented for inclusion in final report.

Task 4: Draft Water Quality Monitoring and Analysis Programme

Based on the results of Tasks 2 and 3, draft a Water Quality Monitoring and Analysis Programme to address water quality measurement, analysis and use, to inform effective water resources management in Saint Lucia. The Programme must include the design of a comprehensive water quality monitoring strategy, identifying locations, timing, parameters to be measured, equipment, stakeholders to be included in obtaining data, as well as methods of data analysis and processing.

The Water Quality Monitoring and Analysis Programme is to be illustrated with maps and diagrams, where appropriate. Potential funding sources for implementation of the Programme must be identified. The Consultant will present the draft report to relevant stakeholders at a facilitated consultative process, and the draft report will also be circulated for feedback and recommendations prior to its finalisation.

Task 5: Design and deliver a Training Initiative

The Consultant will design and implement a training exercise to approved stakeholders to enhance awareness and capability to effectively assess and manage water quality in Saint Lucia. The list of proposed trainees will be submitted to the Project Management Team for approval before delivery of the capacity-building initiative.

Task 6: Submit Final Water Quality Monitoring and Analysis Programme, Training and Consultancy Report

The Consultant will submit a finalised Water Quality Monitoring and Analysis Programme, having incorporated elements of feedback from the consultative processes. A final consultancy report highlighting the nature of the work undertaken,

noting the level of success and constraints in terms of the methodologies used, the nature and quality of stakeholder participation, any potential constraints which are anticipated in effecting recommendations made and any other lessons learnt during the process, must also be included.

REPORTING OBLIGATIONS

All reports will be issued in MSWord format and will each take the form of both hard copies and electronic copies on CD-ROM. The Consultant will be required to submit three (3) hard copies and one (1) electronic copy on CD-ROM of each of the following reports to the Ministry of Sustainable Development, Energy, Science and Technology:

An Inception Report within two (2) weeks of signing the contract. This report will detail the scope of the work, outline the methodology to be used, timelines in the form of a Gantt Chart, and milestones of the Consultancy;

Draft Water Quality Monitoring and Analysis Programme detailing measures for enhancement of water quality monitoring and data analysis in Saint Lucia no later than twelve (12) weeks after signing the contract;

Final Water Quality Monitoring and Analysis Programme, Training and Consultancy Reports capturing stakeholder feedback no later than twenty (20) weeks after signing the contract. The Training Report must present the details of the training initiative, and the Final Consultancy Report must detail the activities undertaken during the assignment, individuals/groups consulted, lessons learned, etc.; and

Monthly Progress Reports to advise on the status of the consulting services.

REQUIRED QUALIFICATIONS AND EXPERIENCE

Consultants will be short-listed based on having:

An in-depth knowledge of water quality in the freshwater and

marine environment, water quality monitoring, citizen monitoring programs, and pollution prevention strategies and implementation of water quality improvement activities as acquired through at least five years of post-qualification experience. Working experience with wastewater management would be an asset.

A demonstrated ability to effectively interact and communicate with diverse stakeholders, including community groups, government officials, regional, intergovernmental organisations, and the multi-lateral donor community in the Caribbean.

At least a Master's degree in water quality, water resources management, environmental engineering, environmental science, with relevant work experience of 5 or more years in a relevant area.

Ability to develop methods of data collection, install and maintain monitoring equipment, interpret data and analyze environmental information to apply solutions, guidelines and policy to field problems.

Excellent organizational, written, and verbal communication skills in English.

Ability to work independently and be a team player.

Ability to communicate on a regular basis via email and phone.

PROJECT EXECUTION AND ADMINISTRATION

The Ministry of Sustainable Development, Energy, Science and Technology will coordinate the planning and implementation of this activity.

The Permanent Secretary, or any other officer designated by him, will administer all aspects of this contract. All communications for the assigned work should be copied to the Chief Sustainable Development and Environment Officer, of the SDED in the Ministry of Sustainable Development, Energy, Science and Technology.

The Consultant will manage his/her time and responsibilities to ensure timely delivery of outputs required under this Terms of Reference. The Consultant will be provided with access to all available data and documentation relevant to the Services.

TIMEFRAME/ IMPLEMENTATION SCHEDULE

It is anticipated that the Consultant will be selected by the Ministry of Sustainable Development, Energy, Science and Technology and that the contract will commence as of June 2014 and be completed no later than five (5) months later. The Permanent Secretary or his delegate(s) will facilitate consultation with Government agencies and other national partners, as and when necessary. All reports of this consultancy will be due no later than twenty (20) weeks after signing the contract.

INVITATION

The Government of Saint Lucia is inviting consultants to submit tenders for a consultancy to conduct its 2010 National Greenhouse Gas Inventory (GHG) for reporting to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change. The submission should be guided by the Terms of Reference contained herein.

TERMS OF REFERENCE

Consultancy: Saint Lucia 2010 National Greenhouse Gas Inventory (GHG) to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change

BACKGROUND

Through the Ministry of Sustainable Development, Energy, Science & Technology, the Government of Saint Lucia is currently embarking on preparatory activities leading up to the production of its Third National Communications (TNC) report to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC). This is in accordance with paragraph 1 of Article 4 of the UNFCCC.

By virtue of a Project Cooperation Agreement with the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) office in Nairobi, the Ministry of Sustainable Development, Energy, Science & Technology (MSDEST) will serve as the executing agency in undertaking activities towards the fulfilment of Saint Lucia's obligations in that regard.

One of the main objectives of the National Communication process is to build local, individual and institutional capacity to implement the Convention. The National Communication Process also seeks to enhance general awareness and knowledge on climate change-related issues in Saint Lucia; assist in the process of national planning and policy formulation, especially as it relates to mainstreaming vulnerability and adaptation measures within the work programme of the various stakeholder agencies; and contribute to the social and economic development of the country by reducing vulnerability associated with climate change, or proposing options to do.

Saint Lucia's GHG Inventory for 2000, which was produced as part of the Second National Communications process, has been

submitted to the UNFCCC, having been compiled based on the required IPCC methodology and guidance.

INTRODUCTION

The GHG inventory is intended to communicate to the Conference of Parties (COP) the anthropogenic emissions by sources and removals by sinks of all greenhouse gases (GHGs) not controlled by the Montreal Protocol. Saint Lucia reported to the UNFCCC its initial GHG inventory based on 1994 figures and its second GHG inventory based on 2000 figures. Under the Second National Communications Process, preliminary figures were produced for 2008.

The focus of this consultancy is the production of the National Inventory Report (NIR) on Greenhouse Gases (GHGs) for the year 2010 utilizing the 1996 IPCC Guidelines for Greenhouse Gas Inventories, IPCC Good Practice Guidance (GPG) 2000 and 2003 where appropriate; Completion of a validation exercise for the 2000-2008 data which has been submitted to the UNFCCC; and producing time series data for the years 2001-2009. These outputs will be submitted as part of Saint Lucia's Third National Communication to the UNFCCC.

OBJECTIVES

The three main objectives of this Consultancy are outlined as follows:

Coordinate a validation exercise of 2000 & 2008 data used in the previous reporting period in order to enhance the capacity to conduct, prepare and report on the GHG Inventory in keeping with the Revised 1996 Guidelines for greenhouse Gas Inventories and Good Practice Guidance (GPG) 2000 and 2003 where appropriate.

Conduct training of local stakeholders and build capacity through information dissemination and supervision of local stakeholders in the use of the Revised 1996 IPCC Guidelines for Greenhouse Gas

Inventories and 2000 & 2003 IPCC Good Practice Guidance (GPG) where appropriate.

Prepare and submit Saint Lucia's NIR on Green House Gases for 2010 along with time series data for 2001 to 2009 to the Ministry of Sustainable Development, Energy, and Science & Technology.

METHODOLOGY

The consultant will be expected to conduct training for local stakeholders and oversee the data collection and data input processes for the National GHG. The Consultant will work in conjunction with Climate Change Project Team and shall perform all tasks listed below in the scope of services required. The Consultant, if so required, shall work in collaboration with a local counterpart, as may be agreed in a separate sub-agreement.

Local training must be in a face-to-face mode so that trainees can receive maximum feedback and interaction with the Consultant;

The Consultant will be required to become familiar with Non-Annex I Inventory Software (NAIIS) database tool for reporting GHG inventories to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) in which the information must be inserted;

The consultant must utilise 1996 IPCC Guidelines for Greenhouse Gas Inventories and 2000 & 2003 IPCC Good Practice Guidance (GPG) where appropriate.

Primary and secondary data collection must be used to validate previous reporting figures and to generate time series data for 2001-2009 as well as to compile the 2010 NIR.

SCOPE OF SERVICES REQUIRED

The Consultant will be required to consult the relevant documents outlined in section 4 above and work in close consultation with the Project Implementation Unit (PIU) for the Third National Communication (TNC) within the Sustainable Development & Environment

Division of MSDEST. The consultant is expected to undertake the following;

Conducting a validation exercise for 2001-2010 data;

Assessment of level of data availability and collection of data for each of the key GHG emission categories of the economy for the period 2001 to 2011;

Complementing of the available data with data gathering surveys to make the data for the base year 2010 as complete as possible;

Using the compiled data to conduct statistical analysis to complete the activity data for the 2010 Inventory base year;

Reviewing and updating in-house training material where necessary to facilitate training of local stakeholders;

Conducting training workshop on the execution of the 2006 National Greenhouse Gas Emission Inventories Guidelines, with special emphasis on the GPG requirements;

Selection and execution of the most appropriate inventory methodology (tier system), taking into consideration the level of available national activity data;

Conducting key sources analysis;

Identification, collection and use of the required emission factors and coefficients and using appropriate defaults where national and/or appropriate regional statistics are lacking;

Overseeing the data compilation and input into the requisite tables and programmes for the GHG inventory compiled by local stakeholders;

Finalising and endorsing the GHG inventory compiled by local stakeholders;

Preparation and Circulation of the GHG Inventory for review and comments by PIU and Technical Expert Group;

Preparation of a GHG Inventory chapter for the TNC;

Writing the NIR which describes:

The procedures and arrangements undertaken to collect and achieve the data and information;

Methodologies used to develop the Inventory;

Areas where data may be further improved and proposed cost-effective national or regional plans and programmes to develop or improve country-specific or regional emissions factors and activity data;

Anthropogenic emissions by sources.

The level of uncertainty associated with inventory data, their underlying assumptions, and the methodologies used for estimating these uncertainties.

DELIVERABLES

The Consultant shall deliver the following:

A work plan at the start of the consultancy, which clearly indicates the methodology and anticipated target outputs.

Revised training manual within two weeks of start of consultancy.

Conduct a one-week training workshop for local consultants on a date to be decided with Project team.

A National Inventory Report (NIR) after review and validation by various stakeholders.

A presentation of findings at a meeting of relevant agencies.

National GHG Inventory Chapter for Third National Communication Report, including the methodologies used in compiling the inventory, the data sources and control procedure.

QUALIFICATIONS AND EXPERIENCE

The consultant must:

Demonstrate prior experience and expertise in conducting Greenhouse Gas Inventories for National Communications for developing country Parties to the UNFCCC.
